An example abstract for the American Association of Bovine Practitioners conference

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### Introduction

The objective of this paper is to explain how to write a research abstract for submission to the American Association of Bovine Practitioners (AABP) Conference. Although the AABP conference has been very pleased with the quality of research abstracts that have been submitted, there have been some inconsistencies in formatting and content. This layout and format should be used as a guideline when you are writing the abstract.

## Materials and methods

The work presented here is a collaborative effort between 3 members of the research committee. The research committee is made of veterinarians who are involved in academia and are active members of AABP. These members met 5 times to discuss the changes that would be made to existing guidelines. During these meetings, they established a timeline to complete these tasks and divided the work evenly among the group. Once the first draft was complete, the material was reviewed by their peers through the use of e-mail and teleconference. An additional revision was made which included adding a sample abstract.

## Results

The final draft of the updated abstract requirements was clear, concise, and helped future submissions meet the criteria. The research abstracts submitted had fewer problems with formatting and content.

## Conclusion

Providing this guide was helpful to clarify what was required in abstract submissions.

ARTICLE TITLE: Capitalize only the first letter of the first word and any proper names

AUTHOR INFORMATION: Author information will be filled in through system, but please make sure the names, degrees, and affiliation are correctly entered on webpage.

# INTRODUCTION:

This section should contain:

- 1. The objective of the study
- 2. Rationale/background for the study

Please do not use bold or underline anywhere in the body of the abstract. The use of superscript, subscript, and italic text should be limited.

MATERIALS AND METHODS: This section should contain pertinent methodological conditions, such as population, sample selection, study design, instrumentation, methodology used, assessment of methodology, data collection, and data analysis.

RESULTS: Should be compiled, condensed, and clearly presented. Only data relating to the objectives should be reported. Statistical inferences should be sufficiently detailed to authenticate interpretation of the data.

CONCLUSION: A clearly stated conclusion which provides a general interpretation of the significance of the results is essential.
